About the role

The primary purpose of the role is to:

[The physiotherapist in this role will work predominantly with patients in the Intensive Care and High Dependency Units. The critical care complex cares for medical, surgical and trauma patients with high acuity needs. This position sits within our cardiorespiratory team, cover across this team and the wider inpatient team is required as the service need indicates.

The Physiotherapist will mentor and support rotational staff, undergraduate students, and Allied Health Assistants to develop clinical skills, as well as routinely supporting colleagues in other clinical areas as the service need arises.

Participation in rostered weekend and overnight on call work is a requirement of this role. Education of other weekend and on call staff in your area of speciality will be required. There may, in the future, be potential to rotate into other areas of our inpatient cardiorespiratory service.

This role requires comprehensive, experienced, physiotherapy assessment and treatment skills to meet the physiotherapy needs of patients in a variety of clinical settings and multidisciplinary

teams. We are a team based on individual skills to give collective strength. We welcome candidates with a broad range of skills that they can bring to the team.

This role can require work in other areas as identified or following a reasonable request in order to support the organisation in managing safe patient care and maintaining service delivery.

Clinical Practice	• Takes legal and professional responsibility for managing own caseload of patients / clients with increasing complexity and be able to independently adapt and make decisions regarding physiotherapy intervention. • Utilises information available to prioritise patients/clients to enable appropriate allocation of referrals and workload with staff in the team. • Carries out comprehensive assessment with patients (and whānau where appropriate). This may include use of standardised assessments to assist in assessment and intervention planning. • Formulates and delivers individualised physiotherapy intervention using comprehensive clinical reasoning skills and in depth knowledge of treatment approaches. This should, take into account the patient's own goals and those of the wider multidisciplinary team (MDT). • Demonstrates effective communication, to establish a therapeutic relationship and set expectations with patients / clients, whānau and the MDT, inclusive of the wider health team and external agencies as appropriate. This includes relaying complex, sensitive and contentious information. • Assesses the patient's understanding of assessment, interventions and goals and gain informed consent for intervention, taking into account those who lack capacity (e.g. those with cognitive difficulties). • Regularly reassesses and evaluates the patient / client's progress against identified goals and adjust intervention as situations change. • Refers on to other services to work with the patient/client towards achievement of longer term goals. • Develops comprehensive discharge / transfer plans as appropriate. • Carries out regular clinical risk assessments for patients/ clients on own caseload and takes action to effectively manage identified risks, seeking support where appropriate. • Demonstrates provision of culturally safe and bicultural practice with patients and their whānau. • Demonstrates an awareness of health inequalities, with evidence of implementing actions within own clinical practice towards reducing these for the patient/client and/or whānau. • Represents the service and / or individual patients/clients at clinical meetings and case conferences to ensure the delivery of a coordinated multidisciplinary service and to ensure physiotherapy is integrated into the overall intervention (where appropriate) including discharge planning.

	• Completes documentation consistent with legal and organisational requirements. • Adheres to any applicable recognised best practice for physiotherapy and any relevant clinical policies and practice guidelines. • Provides advice, teaching and instructions to patients, carers, relatives and other professionals to promote consistency of support being delivered. • Demonstrates awareness of local, sub-regional and regional context in relation to provision of health and social support and the impact on service provision. • Identifies unmet needs of patients and identifies potential solutions to address these needs. • Demonstrates an understanding of the roles of the multidisciplinary team
Teaching & Learning	• Maintains competency to practice through identification of learning needs and Continuing Professional Development (CPD) activities. This should comply with professional registration requirements. • Contributes to the education of physiotherapy students as directed and delegated by student supervisors. • Provides interdisciplinary education in direct clinical area, or discipline specific teaching across teams. • Demonstrates the ability to critically evaluate research and apply to practice. • Maintains an awareness of current developments in the clinical areas being worked in. • Involved in the induction and training of newly appointed staff as required. • Completes mandatory training as applicable for the role. • Participates in an annual performance review and associated clinical assurance activities. • Participates in regular professional supervision in line with the organisations requirements and/or professional body.
Leadership & Management	• Attends and contributes to relevant department, clinical and team meetings. • Assists team leaders and professional leaders in clinical assurance activities of physiotherapy staff as requested. • Directs and delegates work to allied health assistants and support staff as required in the role, ensuring that delegated tasks, documentation and communication is carried out.
Service Improvement and Research	• Undertakes as directed, the collection of data for use in service audit and research projects. • Participates in quality improvement activities when requested. • Contributes to annual planning process, including identifying gaps in service and participating in work / projects that may result from the planning process. • Practises in a way that utilises resources (including staffing) in the most cost effective manner. • Awareness of and complies with all legislative and contractual requirements as applicable to the role (e.g. Health and safety in

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About you – to succeed in this role

You will have

Essential:

- NZ Registered Physiotherapist with current annual practicing certificate
- Minimum of 3-5 years clinical practice, with experience across a range of acute inpatient settings including critical care, cardiorespiratory, orthopaedic and neurology areas, with adults and paediatric patients.
- Ability to work on the on call and weekend rota, covering both adult and paediatric service.
- Skills in working with:
 - Acute cardiorespiratory presentations in high acuity settings such as Intensive Care and high dependency beds (essential)
 - Patients with acute neurological needs, including acute stroke, particularly post-surgery. (Desirable)
 - Those with end of life / palliative care needs. (Desirable)
- Skills in manual handling assessment and training of patients / family / carers / staff.
- Capable in using “SMART” clinical goals to work in an integrated way with multidisciplinary colleagues.
- Capable of working in a high turnover, fast paced environment.
- Prioritisation skills in the acute setting. Caseload management skills to ensure all patients receive physiotherapy intervention in timeframes appropriate to their clinical needs.
- Experience and willingness to provide clinical leadership for less experienced team members and to develop the clinical capabilities of others.
- Willingness to be available as a resource, within a clinical specialty area, to provide clinical support in response to queries from the wider physiotherapy team and district networks.
- Ability to be involved in quality improvement work within the physiotherapy team and at a wider service / clinical level.
- Ability to use an equity based lens to aim to achieve optimal outcomes across all population groups
- Current full NZ (or accepted international) driver’s licence with ability to drive a manual and automatic car (desirable).
